“Made a list of all persons we had harmed and became willing to make amends to them all.”

“Steps Eight and Nine are concerned with personal relations. First, we take a look backward and try to discover where we have been at fault; next we make a vigorous attempt to repair the damage we have done; and third, having thus cleaned away the debris of the past, we consider how, with our newfound knowledge of ourselves, we may develop the best possible relations with every human being we know.

This is a very large order. It is a task which we may perform with increasing skill, but never really finish. Learning how to live in the

greatest peace, partnership, and brotherhood with all men and women, of whatever description, is a moving and fascinating adventure. Every A.A. has found that he can make little headway in this new adventure of living until he first backtracks and really makes an accurate and unsparing survey of the human wreckage he has left in his wake. To a degree, he has already done this when taking moral inventory, but now the time has come when he ought to redouble his efforts to see how many people he has hurt, and in what ways. This reopening of emotional

wounds, some old, some perhaps forgotten, and some still painfully festering, will at first look like a purposeless and pointless piece of surgery. But if a willing start is made, then the great advantages of doing this will so quickly reveal themselves that the pain will be lessened as one obstacle after another melts away.

These obstacles, however, are very real. The first, and one of the most difficult, has to do with forgiveness. The moment we ponder a twisted or broken relationship

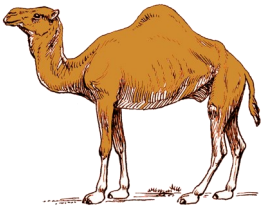
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Tradition 8 Long Form

“Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever non-professional. We define professionalism as the occupation of counseling alcoholics for fees or hire. But we may employ alcoholics where they are going to perform those services for which we might otherwise have to engage nonalcoholics. Such special services may be well recompensed. But our usual A.A. Twelfth Step work is never to be paid for.”

“ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS will never have a professional class. We have gained some understanding of the ancient words, “Freely ye have received, freely give.” we have discovered that at the point of professionalism, money and spirituality do not mix. Almost no recovery from alcoholism has ever been brought about by the world’s best professionals, whether medical or religious. We do not decry professionalism in other fields, but we accept the sober fact that it does not work for us. Every time we have tried to professionalize our Twelfth Step, the result has been exactly the same: Our single purpose has been defeated.

Alcoholics simply will not listen to a paid twelfth-stepper. Almost from the beginning, we have been positive that face-to-face work with the alcoholic who suffers could be based only on the desire to help and be helped. When an A.A. talks for money, whether at a meeting or to a single newcomer, it can have a very bad effect on him, too. The money motive compromised him and evicting he says and does for his prospect. This has always been so obvious that only a very few A.A.’s have ever worked the Twelfth Step for a fee.”

Concept VIII

“The Trustees of the General Service Board act in two primary capacities: (a) With respect to the larger matters of over-all policy and finance, they are the principal planners and administrators. They and their primary committees directly manage these affairs. (b) But with respect to our separately incorporated and constantly active services, the relation of the Trustees is mainly that of full stock ownership and of custodial oversight which they exercise through their ability to elect all directors of these entities.”

“Since our Trustees bear the primary responsibility for the good conduct of all our world service affairs, this discussion deals with the basic concepts and methods by which they can best discharge their heavy obligations. Long experience has not proved that our Board as a whole must devote itself almost exclusively to the larger and more serious questions of policy, finance, group relations, public relations and leadership that constantly confront it. In *these more critical matters*, the Board must of course function with great care and deliberation. Here the Board is expected skillfully to *plan, manage, and execute*.

It follows, therefore, that the close attention of the Board to such larger problems must not be subject to constant distraction and interference. Our Trustees, as a body, cannot be burdened with a mass of lesser matters; they must not concern themselves with the endless questions and difficulties which arise daily, weekly and monthly in the routine conduct of the World Service Office and of our publishing enterprises. In these areas the Board cannot possibly manage and conduct in detail; it must delegate its executive function.

Here the Board’s attitude has to be that of custodial oversight; it cannot be the executive. Hence the Trustees are the guarantors of the good management of A.A. World Services, Inc. and the A.A. Grapevine, Inc. They discharge their custodial obligation by electing the directors of these services, a part of whom must always be

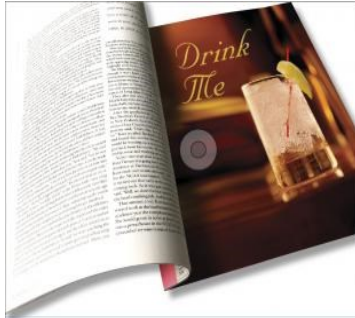

Triggered

In a Michigan doctor's office, a newcomer turned the page in a magazine—and her sobriety

I felt as if I had been blindsided. I was thumbing through a magazine in my doctor's office. I turned the page and there was a picture of a gin and tonic. It was a beautiful picture. Suddenly, all the old feelings came back.

The glass was not so frosty that it totally hid the limes or the ice cubes that I could almost hear tinkling against the sides of the glass. I was completely ambushed. I just have a year sober and here was my nemesis beckoning me, all innocent and inviting. It was my worst enemy. I could hear my mind rationalizing, saying, "Only one won't hurt." But I knew it would hurt.

"You can go where no one knows you," my mind said. But I would know myself. I felt like running out of the office, as if that would get me away from the temptation. As if the obsession could be conquered by geographical change.

I closed the magazine and said the Serenity Prayer. Then I said it again. The

nurse called my name. With palms sweating, I went into the examination. I can't remember anything the doctor said.

When I got to my car, I was still not in control. I stopped for a minute and prayed for the courage to change what I could. Then I drove straight home and called my sponsor.

I told her all the doubts and fears that went through my head in that brief moment. She told me of some of her experiences, like the innocent offer of a drink made by a friend just wishing to be hospitable. She told me about the way she felt at the wake of her mother when everyone toasted her mom's memory. With a glass of soda water held high, she desperately wanted to drown her grief in the bottom of a bottle. "But I just kept repeating 'one day at a time, one minute at a time, one second at a time,' to myself over and over and I was able to get through it sober," she said.

As she was speaking, I realized I had gotten through this situation sober. Whatever I had felt at the doctor's office was behind me now. I was here, safe in my home, talking to a friend who had lived through the same types of experiences.

This crisis was over. There would be more, but I was learning how to live "life on life's terms." The light at the end of this tunnel got a little brighter. My sponsor and I made plans to go to a meeting later that evening.

I took a minute to thank my Higher Power for giving me the strength to resist. I thanked him for giving me my sponsor. I thanked him for my first year of sobriety. Then I got up and did the dishes. "First things first," they say.
