"Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves."

Creation gave us instincts for a purpose. Without them we wouldn't be complete human beings. If men and women didn't exert themselves to be secure in their persons, made no effort to harvest food or construct shelter. there would be no survival. If they didn't reproduce, the earth wouldn't be populated. If there were no social instinct, if men cared nothing for the society of one another, there would be no society, So these desires for the sex relation, for material and emotional security ,and for companionship — are perfectly necessary and right, and surely God-given.

Yet these instincts, so necessary for our existence, often far exceed their proper functions. Powerfully, blindly, many times subtly, they drive us, dominate us, and insist upon ruling our lives. Our desires for sex, for material and emotional security, and for an important place in society often tyrannize us. When thus out of joint, man's natural desires cause him great trouble, practically all the trouble there is. No human being, however good, is exempt from these troubles. Nearly every serious emotional problem can be seen as a case of misdirected instinct. When that happens, our great natural assets, the instincts, have

"With respect to its own affairs, each A.A. group should be responsible to no other authority than its own conscience. But when its plans concern the welfare of neighboring groups also, those groups ought to be consulted. And no group, regional committee, or individual should ever take any action that might greatly affect A.A. as a whole without conferring with the trustees of the General Service Board. On such issues our common welfare is paramount.."

AUTONOMY is a ten-dollar word. But in relation to us, it means very simply that every A.A. group can manage its affairs exactly as it pleases, except when A.A. as a whole is threatened. Comes now the same question raised in Tradition One. Isn't such liberty foolishly dangerous?

Over the years, every conceivable deviation from our Twelve Steps and Traditions has been tried. That was sure to be, since we are so largely a band of ego-driven individualists. Children of chaos, we have defiantly played with every brand of fire, only to emerge unharmed and, we think, wiser. These very deviations created a vast process of trial and error which, under the grace of God, has brought us to where we stand today.



I am responsible. When anyone, anywhere, reaches out for help, I want the hand of AA always to be there. And for that: I am responsible.

Concept IV

Throughout our Conference structure, we ought to maintain at all responsible levels a traditional "Right of Participation," taking care that each classification or group of our world servants shall be allowed a voting representation in reasonable proportion to the responsibility that each must discharge.."

The AA Service Manual/12 Concepts for World Services—pg. 15 of the Concepts Section

The principle of "Participation" has been carefully built into our Conference structure. The Conference Charter specifically provides that the Trustees, the Directors of our service corporations, (A.A. World Services, Inc. and The A.A. Grapevine, Inc.) together with their respective executive staffs, shall always be voting members of the General Service Conference itself.

Exactly the same concept is borne in mind when our General Service Board elects the Directors of its wholly-owned active service corporations, A.A. World Services, Inc. and The A.A. Grapevine, Inc. If it wished, the General Service Board could elect none but its own Trustees to these corporate directorships. But a powerful tradition has grown up to the effect that this never ought to be done.

For example, A.A. World Services, Inc. (which also includes the A.A. Publishing division) currently has seven directors, only two of whom are Trustees. The other five non-Trustee. Directors comprise three volunteers, both expert in office management and publishing, and two directors who are paid staff members: the general manager and his assistant. The general manager is traditionally the president of A.A. World Services, Inc. and his assistant is a vice president. For communication linkage, the editor or a staff member of the Grapevine or his nominee is invited to attend A.A. World Services, Inc. meetings.

Therefore the active management of A.A. World Services, Inc. and its publishing division is composed of Trustees whose mission is to see that these projects are properly managed; of volunteer experts who contribute their advice and professional experience; and of two paid office executives who are charged with getting most of the work done. It will be seen that each member of every classification, is a director, and so has a legal vote; that each corporate officer bears a title which, both practically and legally, denotes what his (or her) actual status and responsibility is.

My old drinking buddies

Learning to navigate longtime friends without much of a struggle

One of the most difficult things I have had to deal with in sobriety is my relationships. But lately I've come to the realization that making new friendships in sobriety has become much easier. After all, I'm a different person than I was before I came to the program.

Today I am much more honest, openminded and willing. And I am actually happy, joyous and free. I believe the key is honesty. It's much easier to make friends and have relationships now that I know who I am and I can be honest about it.

The problem I ran into when I first got sober was that I felt so different from everyone. I had to start all over with the people in my life, including my wife and my family. It made me feel scared. I can remember looking at the person lying next to me in bed and thinking, I don't know anything about her. I'm not even sure if I like her, let alone love her.

This was true not only for my wife, but for all of my old friends. I had spent so much time being drunk, I wasn't sure who anyone was anymore. The biggest obstacle I faced was the difference in me. The ability to drink like me was no longer the prerequisite to being my friend.

To be my friend, a person basically had to be able to have drinks with me and carry on some resemblance of a conversation without getting too drunk or getting into trouble with a spouse, the police...or most importantly, the bartender.



After I came into sobriety, my priorities completely changed. One of the toughest pills for me to swallow was seeing how boring heavy drinkers become. People who have been drinking don't listen to a word anyone says. They talk and hear themselves, but they don't listen. It seems they're always preparing for what they are going to say next and so they don't take the time to hear what others are saying.

What also makes this such a tough pill to swallow is that I now know how boring *I* must have been when I was drunk. Let's face it, I'm no movie star now, but at least today I listen when people are talking to me. There are times when I have to repeat myself over and over again to someone who's been drinking. This is not friendship. It's time consumption.

Today I need more from my friendships. And this can be troubling to me. I drank for more than 30 years, so I have many friends from my past who drink heavily. The problem is, when they get saucy or a little lit up, I no longer find them amusing.

But this doesn't mean I have to get rid of these friends. It just helps me to realize that they aren't so different from me. It's I who must change.

So I have made some changes. When I'm out enjoying an evening with my old drinking friends, I make sure anyone who comes along with me, like my wife, has an alternative ride home. This way, when my friends really "get to drinking," I can be on my way. I enjoy their company while they're beginning their evenings, but not so much after they have had three or four pops.

Sometimes it's tough though, to be the only person not drinking in our old group of friends. But I often remember what our Big Book tells me: We can go anywhere and do all sorts of things as long as "we are spiritually fit." This pushes me to work a strong spiritual program. I enjoy the new friends I've made in the Fellowship, but I also don't want to lose the old friends I made over the years. These friends are still part of my life. After all, it's the only life I've lived and I have no regrets.

By enjoying my relationship with God, I know that I'm no longer alone. The friends I share time with today are genuine and we are friends without much effort. Thanks to AA, my relationships today are freer and without struggle. We like each other simply because we do. I no longer have the need to fill something in myself that's missing. Today, I'm missing nothing.
